'MURPH RELATIVES: IT'S OUR TURN NOW

Families are to consider Saville report and then make their next move for truth

THE FAMILIES of the 11 people murdered by the British Parachute regiment on the streets of Ballymurphy in 1971 have again called for an independent inquiry outside the British justice system.

They are unlikely to have events examined by a British government-backed inquiry after Prime Minister David Cameron said on Tuesday that the Sav-

ille Inquiry into events on Bloody Sunday would be the last of its kind.

John Teggart, whose father Daniel was shot dead on August 9, 1971, and Briege Voyle, daughter of Joan Connolly, shot on the same day as soldiers rampaged through the Belfast estate, were in Derry on Tuesday for the publication of the Saville Report.

Mr Teggart said that all of the Ballymurphy families would take time to con-

sider Lord Saville's findings on the events of Bloody Sunday and decide how to proceed.

In an address to the British House of Commons, Prime Minister David Cameron, apologised for the "unjustified" actions of the Paras in Derry on January 30 1972 when a Civil Rights demonstration ended in the massacre of 13 local people.
